Mandarin Teacher Wins Award

Congratulations to Mr Fan, Head of Languages, who was awarded the UCL IOE Confucius Institute Excellence Award in a ceremony on Saturday. Mr Fan has been recognised by the University College London Institute of Education for his work in introducing Mandarin, initially to the curriculum at Melbourn and more recently across The Cam Academy Trust, of which MVC is a member.

Mr Fan was the first teacher of Mandarin at MVC when we became the first school in Cambridgeshire to introduce the language into the curriculum from Year 7, seven years ago. We now have a total of 3 Mandarin teachers, and also promote the teaching of Mandarin across the Trust – students can now take A Level at Comberton Sixth Form – and to a wider audience.



Mr Fan believes he won the award for his contribution to Mandarin by sharing resources via the UCL IOE platform; working with the Institute and Oundle School to support teacher training as a PGCE mentor; developing the subject across the Trust; creating Chinese cooking videos for online teaching during lockdown, and making a number of videos with a group of Mandarin Excellence Programme students to 'motivate Mandarin learners', which he shared with UCL IOE. Last summer's Mandarin GCSE results saw 55% of candidates from MVC gaining a Level 7 or above with eight pupils achieving Level 9.



He said: "I am extremely happy to receive the 'Excellence Award'. It is an absolute honour that I will cherish for the rest of my career.

"The award caught me by surprise, but I will live up to the new standards drawn up for me. Because of the hard work of MVC students in the last six years with the excellent GCSE exam results, and the contribution from other Mandarin teachers, plus the support from the members of staff in the school, I had the chance to win the award. Therefore, I thank all of them for my unanticipated award."

Teaching and Learning at MVC

This week staff have been considering how literacy is taught within our subjects. Mr Bacon from the English department shared some background on tiers of language:

- Tier 1 high-frequency words in spoken language (eg table, slowly, write, horrible)
- Tier 2 high frequency in written texts (eg gregarious, beneficial, required, maintain)
- Tier 3 subject specific, academic language (eg osmosis, trigonometry, onomatopoeia)

It was interesting for staff to reflect on how we often explicitly teach Tier 3 within our specialist subjects, but tier 2 words may sometimes be a challenge for pupils. Staff will be asking pupils to speak in full sentences to improve their everyday literacy, as well as trying to ensure Tier 1 and Tier 2 words are understood by pupils.

Enterprise Day

On Wednesday we welcomed visitors from *Form the Futu*re to deliver our Year 9 Enterprise Day. Jen Wilby, the facilitator, led a team of volunteers who worked with students to help them learn about the core principles involved in starting their own business. The students worked in small teams to identify a problem and solution, then apply business basics to turn that solution into an enterprise idea. Each team then pitched their idea to their class, with the best pitch going forward to present their idea to the rest of the year group in front of guest entrepreneurs in a *'Dragon's Den'* style finale in the Hall. Well done to the winning team from tutor group 9 Lewis (Izabel, Aliyah, Amelia, Frances, and Laura) for their fantastic idea called "The Future" which was about how a funeral process could help the environment by planting more trees. The winning team may have the opportunity to take part in the Cambridgeshire County Final at Newmarket Racecourse next year.



Mobile phones in school

Just a reminder that the rule "On site, out of sight" applies to mobile phones. If a student is seen using their phone, or with earphones in, these items will be confiscated and taken to reception. The behaviour will be logged on Go4Schools and students can collect their phone from reception at the end of the day. There is a new 'Walkie Talkie' App which makes a loud bleep and students then talk through the phone like a walkie-talkie. This is causing some disruption in lessons and students have been reminded that this will result in phones being confiscated.



Physical Education

The Year 7 hockey team travelled to Bassingbourn VC for their first fixture. We were able to take a strong squad of 19 eager students, who played in 2 teams and rotated against the opposition. Both squads played some excellent hockey; they demonstrated enthusiasm and perseverance to score their first-ever competitive goal. The team went from strength to strength and ended up winning 2-1.



It's not often we thank the rain clouds, but the recent deluge of the wet stuff has meant we have restarted our rugby fixtures as the ground is no longer bone dry! On Wednesday our Year 8 and 9 students hosted Comberton, and on Tuesday 15th we host Bassingbourn.

Our Year 11 boys football team are now in the last 120 schools out of 500+ in the English Schools FA Cup. Their next game is Tuesday 22nd November against Samuel Whitbread School from Bedford. We wish them luck.


